FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

As some of you know, the June Branch meeting was very contentious as the membership debated two proposed bylaw changes. Several members approached the floor to voice their opinion about the bylaws under dispute. After a call for the question was made and seconded, the membership cast their votes. This is when democracy appeared. We all have heard and understood that the majority wins. It was no different at the June Branch meeting.

One of the proposed bylaw changes called for a pay increase for the Branch President position which I currently hold. Members exercised their right to express their opinion for or against the bylaw change. As each member approached the floor to address the membership, one thing stood out with each speaker. Each member, whether for or against the proposed bylaw, spoke highly of the work I have been performing as the Branch 132 President. They stated great things about my accomplishments. They spoke of my dedication and commitment to the membership, and they each recognized the long hours I tirelessly work for the benefit of the members of Branch 132. One of the speakers even reminded the membership that my service to Branch 132 is by my choice. Their compliments spoke volume to the six years that I have served as your Branch President. Despite their remarks, the membership voted against the proposed bylaw change.

Immediately following the meeting, members began to send me messages of gratitude in support of the work I do for the branch. However, my greatest compliment came from my son who is also a member of Branch 132. In a text message to me he stated, "That

was impressive. I don't judge off wins and losses. I'm looking at how you can control a room. How you can remain even-keel in a toxic environment. How you can look for a solution instead of dwell on something. Saying stuff like you worked those extra hours because you chose to, is true but shouldn't a President go over and beyond? Or do they just want a mediocre president?" That to me was the statement of the night.

As I pondered over what my son said, I stumbled upon an article from our newly appointed National Vice-President John Henry in the Postal Record. Vice-President Henry stated, "The best ability is dependability" and I agree. No, I am NOT a mediocre president. I became actively involved with the union in 1994 when I was first elected as a steward. I served Branch 132 as a Step 2 representative (currently known as Formal A), as a Formal A representative, as a Step B representative, as an Arbitration Advocate for our National Business Agent, and I have faithfully served as the Branch President for the last six years. I am also a graduate of the NALC Leadership Academy. I have used the tools I have acquired over the years to bring successful results to the membership in their disputes with the Postal Service. "I Was About to Pass Out"

I regularly hear this phrase from carriers who are sharing their horror stories about their experiences with the heat: "I was about to pass out." And it always aggravates me. Because if you are about to pass out, then you have waited too long to take measures to protect yourself from the heat.

If you are about to pass out, what are your options? You can't drive anywhere, because you might pass out and run off the road. You might be able to call someone, but you also might pass out before you can tell them what is wrong. You can try to walk to an air-conditioned shelter, but what if you pass out while you are walking there? And too often we hear of carriers, discovered by customers, who are passed out in driveways, because that carrier was about to pass out from the heat, but just kept going.




Before you get to the point where you are about to pass out, stop carrying mail. Yes, your supervisor might throw a hissy fit if you get back late, but that is not your problem. Your responsibility is to make sure you take care of yourself and do not succumb to the heat. Listen to your body so you can tell when the heat is starting to affect you. And when you feel that you are getting overheated, don't push yourself to the point that you are about to pass out. Stop when you first feel the effects of the heat, and go to an air-conditioned place. If you have an air-conditioned truck, sit in the truck with the A/C on (make sure you stay in the driver's seat while it is running). Drink some cool water. Relax. Take some deep breaths. You know what cools you off and what is best for you. And once you have cooled off, try again to safely carry some mail.

Don't rely on your supervisor to take care of you. If you feel you are in danger from the heat, call 911. If you need to tell your supervisor that you will return late, try texting them on the scanner to reduce the chances of a negative interaction with them. If you have to call them, cool off and relax in an air-conditioned place before you call them, and stay there while you call them.

If resting in an air-conditioned place doesn't help, then you may need to go home or go back to the station. If you do, file a report of an on-the-job injury. This can be done online at "ecomp.dol.gov", or you can get the form from your supervisor. Also fill out the Heat Injury Report that is in this newsletter, and you can email that to peralta@nalc.org or give it to your steward or branch officer.

It's a cliché, but it's true: You are your most important delivery. Delivering mail in the heat is challenging, but it should not be life-threatening. Do what you need to do to protect yourself, and never push yourself to the point that you are about to pass out.

A special thank you goes out to John Torrez the role he played in getting this task accomplished.

However, it was the letter carriers who were the driving force and demonstrated such by collecting a grand total of 510,780 pounds of food to be distributed to communities throughout the district. Of that total, Branch 132 collected 425,899. Those offices who collected the most food was recognized for an outstanding job at the June Branch meeting.

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

At the June branch meeting, which was well attended in person and via ZOOM, we discussed and voted on two very important proposed by-laws. At similar times in our history, emotions have run high and occasionally, one or more of our members have repeatedly interrupted members who had the floor during a debate. I think this would be an appropriate time to inform the membership, very specifically, as to what our by-laws say regarding proper conduct at branch meetings.

ARTICLE XII RULES OF ORDER

Section 5 – When the presiding officer is addressing the meeting or putting the question, strict silence shall be observed by the members.

Section 10 – Each member speaking on any question shall stand and respectfully address the chair, await recognition, and confine himself/herself to the question under debate and avoid all personalities, indecorous, ironical or sarcastic language.

Section 12 – A member shall not be interrupted while speaking except by appoint of order or for the purpose of explanation.

Section 13 – When a member is called to order for words spoken, the objectionable words shall, if required, be taken down by the Secretary.

Section 30 – Any member who shall misbehave at any meeting of this Branch, who shall disturb the order or harmony thereof by profane or abusive language, or by disorderly conduct, or who shall refuse obedience to the presiding officer, shall be admonished for the first offense by the presiding officer, and if he/she offends again shall be excluded from the room for the balance of the meeting.

It is my hope that the information I have provided will educate the membership, as to how our union should conduct its business at branch meetings. Members who attend these meetings deserve a proceeding that is orderly and respectful. I believe everyone would agree.


